I enclose herewith copy of letter to Mr. Cutler. Mr. Cahill seems to have grown suspicious all of a sudden. Perhaps I am over-sensitive. I understood that he expressed a desire to consult me about these matters, and he certainly expressed a desire to hear the music which we make. I had it installed in my quarters here and when I asked Mr. Cahill to lunch with me and incidentally hear the music, he informed me that he did not care to take the matter up in that way, but would give due consideration to any papers submitted.

I hope to find that in the telephonic conversation I have misunderstood his attitude, but I do not feel just now that I can, without some loss of dignity, further approach him in the matter. Of course I want all those who are interested in the franchise question in your company to be fully aware of our movements. I know that otherwise we will be at once challenged by all the electrical interests that may think themselves in anyway affected by our efforts - hence I wanted a very complete understanding.

I am sure you will be very much interested, quite aside from any business arrangement existing between the New York Telephone Company and ourselves.
