My dear Mr. Fish;-

I have already sent copy of the proposed amendment for the telephone act to Mr. Cutler. I had supposed that it had also gone to you, and learning that it had not, I enclose copy herewith.

I addressed you in the matter for two reasons; First, as the original negotiations had begun with you, and second; because ~~of~~ the effect of legislation at Albany runs throughout the whole state of New York, as well as New York proper.

If our proposed legislation were to be harmful to the telephone interests in general, it might affect the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, as well as the New York Telephone Company.

Since writing you, I have had a very satisfactory interview with Mr. Cutler. In taking the field, it will not be necessary to deal at arms length as it seemed at first to be the case.
