I was a Telegraph boy at that time, and I brought Telegrams to their House on upper Walnut St. I am sure it was the second house from Hampshire St on the East side on the even numbers. When I rang the door bell, and came in, the house was wired, with phonographs, all wires and horns. with some noise like crackling music. I delivered a great many telegrams to them. My Father was an iron molder at that time, and a short time <sup>after</sup> I also learned the trade, that's when I also met Mr. Cahill also one of his brothers. When his machine went out most of the heavy castings went back to the foundry to be broken up for scrap. A short time after the Cahills keep busy on making up a night lights for night Ball games that is baseball. They did not make good ~~of~~ on this project, they were ahead of times on this project, those days most people worked 10 ~~or~~ hours a day. They were no night baseball. They did not lose on this project for about 3 yrs they sold these lights to the U.S. ~~Naval~~ Navy Then they went on to make a base ball pitching machine, they had fair success with this machine.

As to where the <sup>or music</sup> Talking machine, and lights were casted was a small wooden foundry on Sargent St and Commercial St, That site is now Rogers Warehouse. It was called Then Mr. <sup>Hugh</sup> ~~Cough~~ Foundry.
